
What do you know about Martinique? What don't you know? What are you most curious about? In your opinion, what are the main challenges that the island faces today?



Course Material & Introduction

- This place is where justice was sought out. Nowadays a cultural center, inside you should take a picture of the person who led India's independence movement.
- 3) I'm the opposite of "woman stay" and also a tree. Take a picture of me!
- 4) I'm what builds up castles, tears down mountains, makes some blind and helps others see...? Where can you find me in Fort-de-France? Go there and put me in the zipper bag.
- 5) I was born to a planter family in 1763 in Martinique and had an exceptional destiny. There's something in Fort-de-France to commemorate me situated close to the road of "Liberty" where it's nice and green. Take a picture of it.
- I'm the center of religious life in Fort-de-France. Take a picture of me AND find out when I was built.
- 7) This is where you can buy the freshest produce from local planters, situated between the Siger and Blénac streets. In here you have to take a picture of what locals use to stir their rum (hmm hmm?) AND of the spice that's actually the inner bark of a tree, very scented and often used in desserts.
